Mississippi Mud Pie

This Mississippi Mud Pie is gooey, rich and fudgy. Looks good but the recipe is untried.

Ingredients:

- 4 oz 60% bittersweet Chocolate, chopped
- 1 oz unsweetened chocolate, chopped
- 7 Tbsp unsalted butter
- 1 Cup sugar
- 4 large eggs
- 1 tsp pure vanilla extract
- 1/4 tsp salt

2/3 Cup all-purpose flour 3/4 Cup milk-chocolate morsels 1 premade chocolate cookie pie crust (unbaked) Whipped cream, chocolate shavings & mini semisweet chocolate for garnish

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In the top of a double boiler, over simmering water, melt together the bittersweet chocolate, unsweetened chocolate and butter. Remove from heat.

Place sugar in a bowl and, using a spatula, add the melted chocolate mixture and mix well. Mix in the eggs, one at a time, making sure each egg is well combined before adding the next one. Stir in the vanilla and salt. Gradually mix in the flour, a little at a time, until well combined. Fold in the milk chocolate morsel. Pour filling into crust.

Bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out almost clean. Let pie cool completely on a wire rack. Garnish with whipped cream, chocolate shavings and mini-chocolate chips.0

honor those who died while serving in the country's armed forces. This holiday was originally called Decoration Day and originated after the American Civil War to commemorate the Union and Confederate soldiers who died in that war.

The traditional observance of this holiday

includes the flag of the United States being raised briskly to the top of the staff and then solemnly lowered to the half-staff position where it remains only until noon. Then it is raised to full-staff for the remainder of the day. The half-staff position remembers the more than one million men and women who gave their lives in service of their country. At noon, their memory is raised by the living, who resolve not to let their sacrifice be in vain, but to rise up in their stead and continue the fight for liberty and justice for all.

Other traditions observed on Memorial Day is the Laying of the Wreath at The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier along with various organizations who volunteer and decorate the graves of fallen soldiers by placing flags on them to honor them. Towns/cities may also have a Memorial Day Parade along with other associated activities.

IMPORTANT New Mass. State Headlights Law

Memorial Day is a Federal Holiday where we If you haven't heard — effective April 7th, 2015, there was a new driving law put into place which requires Massachusetts drivers to use their headlights and tail lights when your windshield wipers are in use. Headlights must also be on a half-hour after sunset and a half-0hour before sunrise. It also requires drivers to use their headlights and tail lights whenever the visibility is less than 500 feet.

> If you do not comply — the fine for violating the new law is only \$5.00, but a driver who gets ticketed for a headlights offense will also face an insurance surcharge.

Some vehicles have what is referred to as daylight running lights. If you do have this in your vehicle - please check to see if your taillights are also on when using that feature. Both headlights and tail lights must be on and that is not always the case with the daylight running lights.

The COA has always been a proponent of using your headlights during the day — whether it's raining/snowing or not. It is a good safety habit. Having your lights on during the day does nothing to improve your driving vision BUT it does help other vehicles on the road see you.

What To Do After A Tick Bite To Prevent Lyme Disease

There are many different types of ticks in the US, some of which are capable of transmitting infections. The risk of developing these infections depends upon the geographic location, season of the year, type of tick, and, for Lyme disease, how long the tick was attached to the skin.

The deer that transmits Lyme disease must feed at least 36 hours before transmission of the spirochete germ. If a person is bitten by a deer tick, a healthcare provider will likely advise one of two approaches.

- Observe and treat if signs or symptoms of infection develop.
- Treat with a preventive antibiotic immediately.

There is usually no benefit of blood testing for Lyme disease at the time of the tick bite, even people who become infected will not have a positive blood test until approximately two to six weeks after the infection develops.

How To Remove A Tick:

The proper way to remove a tick is to use a set of fine tweezers and grip the tick as close to the skin as is possible. Do not use a smoldering match or cigarette, nail polish, petroleum jelly, liquid soap, or kerosene because they may irritate the tick and cause it to behave like a syringe, injecting bodily fluids into the wound.

- Use fine tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin surface as possible.
- Pull backwards gently but firmly, using an even, steady pressure. Do not jerk or twist.
- Do not squeeze crush or puncture the body of the tick, since its bodily fluids may contain infection-causing organisms.

- After removing the tick, wash the skin and hands thoroughly with soap and water.
- If any mouth parts of the tick remain in the skin, these should be left alone. They will be expelled on their own. Attempts to remove these parts may result in significant skin trauma.

After The Tick Is Removed:

It is helpful if the person can provide information about the size of the tick, whether it was actually attached to the skin, and how long it was attached.

- The size and color of the tick help to determine what kind it was.
- Ticks that are brown and approx. the size of a poppy seed or pencil point are deer ticks. These are your Lyme carrying ticks.
- Ticks that are brown with a white color and about the size of a pencil eraser are more likely to be dog ticks. These ticks do not carry Lyme disease.
- A brown to black tick with a white splotch on its back is likely a a female "Lone Star tick." This tick causes a rash similar but without the other features of Lyme disease.
- A tick that was not attached, was easy to remove or just walking on the skin, and was still flat and tiny and not full of blood when it was removed could not have transmitted Lyme disease or any other infection since it had not yet taken a blood meal.
- Only ticks that are attached and have finished feeding or are near the end of their meal can transmit Lyme disease. After arriving on the skin, the tick that spreads Lyme disease usually takes 24 hours before feeding begins.
- Even if a tick is attached, it must have taken a blood meal to transmit Lyme disease. At least 36 to 48 hours of feeding is required for a tick to have fed and then transmit the bacterium that causes Lyme Disease. After this amount of time the tick will be engorged (full of blood). An engorged tick has a globular shape and is larger than an unengorged one.
