ARTICLE 1. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from the Fiscal Year 1999 Elementary School Budget the sum of \$4,084 to fund bills and charges from previous fiscal years; said funds to be spent under the direction of the Elementary School Committee.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to transfer from the Elementary School Committee the sum of \$4,084 to fund bills and charges from previous fiscal years; said funds to be spent under the direction of the Elementary School Committee.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from free cash the sum of \$25,000 tc additionally fund the FY 1999 Finance Committee Reserve Fund; said funds to be spent under the direction of the Finance Committee.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to transfer from free cash the sum of \$25,000 to additionally fund the FY 1999 Finance Committee Reserve Fund said funds to be spent under the direction of the Finance Committee.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to transfer from free cash the sum of \$3,750 to fund a portion of the costs for a temporary repair and a portion of the engineering costs for road reconstruction and drainage on the road into Camp Wakanda, off Main Street, said fund to be spent under the direction of the Conservation Commission.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to transfer from free cash the sum of \$3,750 to fund a portion of the costs for a temporary repair and a portion of the engineering costs for road reconstruction and drainage on the road into Camp Wakanda, off Main Street, said fund to be spent under the direction of the Conservation Commission.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to dissolve the Special Town Meeting.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was voted, by unanimous voice vote, to dissolve Special Town Meeting at 7:25 p.m.

Voters of the Town of Boxford met at the Masconomet Regional High School on Tuesday, May 11, 1999. Moderator Gerald R. Johnston called the Annual Town Meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The Articles of the Warrant were disposed of accordingly.

Prior to addressing the Articles, as presented, the following presentations were made:

Mr. Richard Pierce, who achieved a highly successful trip to the North Pole presented the Town of Boxford flag upon being proudly flown atop the North Pole.

Mr. DeWitt Minich, a long-standing resident of the Town of Boxford, was presented an Outstanding Citizen Award by the Boxford-Topsfield-Middleton Rotary Club.

ARTICLE 1. To receive and place on file the reports of the Town Officers and Committees without ratification of any action taken or authorization of any action proposed.

Upon motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to receive and place on file the reports of the Town Officers and Committees without ratification of any action taken or authorization of any action proposed.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Recycling Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § 53E½ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Board of Health and used for the deposit of receipts and fees collected on recyclable materials; said recyclable materials to be determined by a joint vote of the Board of Health and Recycling Committee and to be in compliance with all state health regulations; and, further, to allow the Board of Health, or the Recycling Committee, with the approval of the Board of Health, to expend funds not to exceed \$15,000 for Fiscal Year 2000 from said account for the operation and maintenance of the Town Recycling Center; said authorization to be contingent upon the maintenance of specific recycling fees by the Board of Health for construction and demolition materials, tires and other materials banned from disposal in the landfill; and contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Health to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote to authorize the establishment of a Recycling Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § $53E\frac{1}{2}$ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Board of Health and used for the deposit of receipts and fees collected on recyclable materials; said recyclable

materials to be determined by a joint vote of the Board of Health and Recycling Committee and to be in compliance with all state health regulations; and, further, to allow the Board of Health, or the Recycling Committee, with the approval of the Board of Health, to expend funds not to exceed \$15,000 for Fiscal Year 2000 from said account for the operation and maintenance of the Town Recycling Center; said authorization to be contingent upon the maintenance of specific recycling fees by the Board of Health for construction and demolition materials, tires and other materials banned from disposal in the landfill; and contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Health to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

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ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Printing Revolving Acc as authorized by Chapter 44, § $53E\frac{1}{2}$ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account t expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen and used for the deposit of receipts and collected on the sale of printed official documents as required by law by several of the elected appointed committees, commissions, and boards as well as legal advertisements which are reimbut to the Town; to expend funds not to exceed \$10,000 for Fiscal Year 2000 from said account fo costs to the Town for printing and reimbursable advertising; and contingent upon an annual refrom the Board of Selectmen to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account fiscal year.

Upon a motion duly made and seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to authorize establishment of a Printing Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § 53E½ of Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be expended under the direction of the Boar Selectmen and used for the deposit of receipts and fees collected on the sale of printed of documents as required by law by several of the elected and appointed committees, commissions, boards as well as legal advertisements which are reimbursed to the Town; to expend funds nexceed \$10,000 for Fiscal Year 2000 from said account for the costs to the Town for printing reimbursable advertising; and contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Selectmen to Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

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ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Library Photocopy Mac Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § 53E¹/₂ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Board of Library Trustees and used for the dej of receipts collected through public use of the photocopy machines at both the Boxford Village and West Boxford libraries; and further to allow the Board of Library Trustees to expend fees not to exceed \$5,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account for ongoing supplies maintenance of the copy machines, and purchase of other library supplies and contingent upon a annual report from the Board of Library Trustees to the Town on the total receipts and expenditure the Account each fiscal year.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to authorize the establishment of a Library Photocopy Machine Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter $53E\frac{1}{2}$ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Boar Library Trustees and used for the deposit of receipts collected through public use of the photomachines at both the Boxford Village and West Boxford libraries; and further to allow the Boar Library Trustees to expend fees not to exceed \$5,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account ongoing supplies and maintenance of the copy machines, and purchase of other library supplies contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Library Trustees to the Town on the total receipt and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Conservation Revolving Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Sec. 53E¹/₂ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Conservation Commission and used for the deposit of receipts collected through fees by direction of the Conservation Commission and further to allow the Conservation Commission to expend fees not to exceed \$5,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account for extraordinary Conservation Commission application review expenses and contingent upon an annual report from the Conservation Commission to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to authorize the establishment of a Conservation Revolving Fund as authorized by Chapter 44, Sec. 53E¹/₂ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Conservation Commission and used for the deposit of receipts collected through fees by direction of the Conservation Commission and further to allow the Conservation Commission to expend fees not to exceed \$5,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account for extraordinary Conservation Commission application review expenses and contingent upon an annual report from the Conservation Commission to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the establishment of a Highway Safety Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § 53E¹/₂ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Board Selectmen and used for the deposit of receipts collected through fines assessed against commercial motor vehicles by the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit; and further to allow the Board of Selectmen to expend fees not to exceed \$10,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account for the purchase and maintenance of equipment

related to highway safety; contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Selectmen to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Upon motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to authorize the establishment of a Highway Safety Revolving Account as authorized by Chapter 44, § $53E^{1/2}$ of the Massachusetts General Laws, said account to be under the direction of the Board of

Selectmen and used for the deposit of receipts collected through fines assessed against commercial motor vehicles by the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Unit; and further to allow the Board of Selectmen to expend fees not to exceed \$10,000 for fiscal year 2000 from said account for the purchase and maintenance of equipment related to highway safety; contingent upon an annual report from the Board of Selectmen to the Town on the total receipts and expenditures of the Account each fiscal year.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will adopt the Classification Plan and Compensation Plan for FY 2000, as submitted by the Personnel Board under Article 5 of the Town Bylaws; said Classification Plan and Compensation Plan as printed in this warrant.

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Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to adopt Classification Plan and Compensation Plan for FY 2000, as submitted by the Personnel Board un Article 5 of the Town Bylaws; said Classification Plan and Compensation Plan as printed in t warrant.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,522,215 to fund proposed Town Budget for the use of several departments for fiscal year 2000, to wit: Gene Government, Finance, Public Safety, Education, Town Maintenance, Insurance and Pensions; all printed in this warrant, and permit expenditure of these funds under the direction of the appropri listed department.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to raise appropriate the sum of \$14,522,215 to fund the proposed Town Budget for the use of severe departments for fiscal year 2000, to wit: General Government, Finance, Public Safety, Educati Town Maintenance, Insurance and Pensions; all as printed in this warrant, and permit expenditure these funds under the direction of the appropriate listed department.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of **\$20,539** to fund the sal and associated materials expenses necessary to hire a new, part time, Reference Librarian for Boxford Town Libraries, said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Libu Trustees, said appropriation to be fully contingent upon successful passage of the related proposit $2\frac{1}{2}$ override ballot question.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote, to raise appropriate the sum of \$20,539 to fund the salary and associated materials expenses necessary to 1 a new, part time, Reference Librarian for the Boxford Town Libraries, said funds to be expen under the direction of the Board of Library Trustees, said appropriation to be fully contingent upon successful passage of the related proposition 2½ override ballot question.

C. 59, § 21C, for the amounts required to pay the Town's share of principal and interest on the borrowing authorized by the District, and if such referendum is passed, this vote will be deemed to be a disapproval. Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to approve the indebtedness authorized by the Regional District School Committee of the Masconomet School District on March 17, 1999, for the purpose of construction, architectural, engineering, furnishings, equipment, and other costs associated with the building project for the expansion and renovation of the district school buildings and facilities, provided that said approval shall be contingent upon the passage of a Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ debt exclusion referendum under M.G.L. C. 59, § 21C, for the amounts required to pay the Town's share of the principal and interest on the borrowing authorized by the District, and if such referendum is not passed, this vote will be deemed to be a disapproval .Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article, subject to successful passage of related Proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ override ballot question.

Capital Budgeting Committee Recommendation: "A" - Essential Estimated Total Construction Cost: \$51,654.000. (Boxford's Share: \$22,200,889.)

ARTICLE 11. ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds the sum of \$30,000 to fund all necessary testing, study, analysis and engineering costs associated with the development of a Wetlands Remediation Alternatives Plan for the wetlands adjacent to the Boxford Sanitary Landfill, said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Health, or take any other action thereon.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to pass over this article.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate sum of \$35,000 to fund an additional employee for the Department of Public Works, create a second foreman position, fund additional equipment and supply purchases as necessary to improve current DPW services and add additional grounds keeping and playing field maintenance duties to the DPW; said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen, said appropriation to be fully contingent upon successful passage of the related proposition 2½ override ballot question.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote, to raise and appropriate sum of \$35,000 to fund an additional employee for the Department of Public Works, create a second foreman position, fund additional equipment and supply purchases as necessary to

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improve current DPW services and add additional grounds keeping and playing field maintenance duties to the DPW; said funds to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen, said appropriation to be fully contingent upon successful passage of the related proposition $2\frac{1}{2}$ overrice ballot question.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this Article, subject to successful passage of relate Proposition 2 ½ override ballot question.

To see if the Town will vote to borrow \$385,000 in order to pay for architectural design and engineering services and to fund related permits and expenses necessary to obtain the required approvals and plans for the construction of a new Town Hall on Town owned property off Spofford Road, said funds to be spent under the direction of the Board of Selectmen; or take any other action thereon.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by a greater than two-thirds vote of 206 in favor and 21 opposed, to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow **\$385,000** in order to pay for architectural design and engineering services and to fund related permits and expenses necessary to obtain the required approvals and plans for the construction of a new Town Hall on Town owned property off Spofford Road, said funds to be spent under the direction of the Board of Selectmen; said appropriation fully contingent upon successful passage of related Proposition 2 ½ ballot question.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this article. Capital Budgeting Committee Recommendation: "A" – Essential Priority **ARTICLE 15.** To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to petition the legislature to permit he Town to change the use of an 11.6 acre portion of the town owned land on Bayns Hill, originally icquired for "open space/public domain" use for the purpose of construction and maintenance of one elecommunications tower and associated buildings, equipment and fencing,

Jpon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote, to pass over thus rticle.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the care, custody, maintenance and control of portion of the land described below, owned by the town and currently under the care, custody naintenance and control of the Board of Selectmen for open space and public domain purposes, to the loard of Selectmen for the purposes described herein and to authorize the Selectmen to investigate, egotiate and enter into a long term ten year lease of a 11.6 acre portion of the property now known as he town owned land on Bayns Hill, being a portion of the

roperty identified in the records of the Assessors as a 31.44 acre parcel located on Map 17. Block 2, ot 31; said lease for the purpose of the construction and maintenance of one telecommunications over and associated buildings, equipment and fencing; said authorization subject to the etermination by the Selectmen that the Bayns Hill location is appropriate for municipal public safety adio dispatch and that any tower constructed will contain and maintain the municipal public safety adio system; and to authorize the Selectmen to define the exact location of the portion to be ermitted for tower use, which is generally as shown on a plan of land entitled "Bayns Hill Proposed ower Site, Boxford Massachusetts", scale 1" = 200', dated October 4, 1999, prepared by the Town f Boxford and on file with the Town Clerk; any resulting construction of a tower to be regulated by le Zoning Board of Appeals pursuant to town zoning by-laws, or take any other action thereon.

Ipon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by a greater than two-thirds voice vote, to ass over this article.

RTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 5 of the Town's Historic Districts formission Bylaw to delete the words "thirty (30)" appearing in the third line thereof and to abstitute therefor the words "sixty" (60) so that the Section reads:

Then taking action under the provisions of the second paragraph of Section 7 of the Historic Districts ot, General Laws, Chapter 40C, the Historic Districts Commission shall make a determination within sixty (60) days after the filing of the application for a certificate of appropriateness, or such other time as the applicant may in writing allow; or take any other action thereon.

Explanation: The purpose of this amendment is to bring the Town's Historic Districts Commiss Bylaw into compliance with the time period allowed by the State Historic Districts Act. The Histe Districts Commission meets on a monthly basis. Under the current Bylaw, the Commission must at the meeting at which an application is submitted in order to comply with the Town's Byla Failure to act within 30 days entitles the applicant to a certificate of hardship. The propo amendment would allow the Commission the period of time allowed by state law to consider and upon a submission by an applicant. It would also allow the Commission the opportunity to requ additional information from the applicant and grant the applicant time within which to submit t information to the Commission.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote greater than to thirds, to amend Section 5 of the Town's Historic Districts Commission Bylaw to delete the wo "thirty (30)" appearing in the third line thereof and to substitute therefor the words "sixty" (60) so t the Section reads:

When taking action under the provisions of the second paragraph of Section 7 of the Historic District. Act, General Laws, Chapter 40C, the Historic Districts Commission shall make a determinat within sixty (60) days after the filing of the application for a certificate of appropriateness, or su further time as the applicant may in writing allow.

Sponsored by the Historic Districts Commission.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a revision and codification of the Bylaws of Town, as set forth in a codification entitled "The Code of The Town of Boxford", dated October 1999, a copy of which is on file in the Town Clerk's Office; said codification being a renumbering the various bylaws, and said Code being a compilation of the present bylaws of the Town having substantive changes in the text thereof unless previously amended by action of the Town Meeting; take any other action thereon.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to adop revision and codification of the Bylaws of the Town, as set forth in a codification entitled "The Cc of The Town of Boxford", dated October 26, 1999, a copy of which is on file in the Town Cler. Office; said codification being a renumbering of the various bylaws and minor clerical correctio and said Code being a compilation of the present bylaws of the Town having no substantive chang in the text thereof unless previously amended by action of the Town Meeting.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to approve the expenditure of **\$250,000** to enable to Conservation Commission to purchase a certain parcel of land known as the Hebb Property consisting of 6.00 acres, more or less, said parcel shown as a portion of Map 6, Block 1, Parcel 34 in the record of the Boxford Assessors; further as shown as lot #4, on a plan of land entitled: "Topographic Plan Land in Boxford, MA, scale 1"= 80 feet, prepared by JA-BY Engineering, Inc., 363 Boston Stre Topsfield, MA on October 9, 1998 on file with the Town Clerk, together with all flowage and oth rights and easements and subject to all well rights and easements; that said land be conveyed to t Town under the provisions of Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 8C, and as it m

hereafter be amended and other Massachusetts Statutes relating to Conservation, to be managed and controlled by the Conservation Commission, said funds to be expended from the debt authorized under Article 37 of the Boxford Annual Town Meeting held on May 14, 1997, and the Town and the Conservation Commission be authorized to enter into all

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the Massachusetts Legislature to change the town boundary line between the Towns of Boxford and Georgetown in the vicinity of Baldpate Pond, and to authorize the Selectmen to define the exact location of the new town boundary line, the proposed boundary line being generally as shown on a plan entitled <u>"Plan of Land Showing the Reconfiguration of Town Boundary Between the Towns of Boxford and Georgetown, Massachusetts</u>" dated September 8, 1999 and revised September 30, 14990, Scale 1" = 60', prepared by Apple Associates, Inc., a copy of which is on file in the office of the Town Clerk, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to approve amendments to the proposed boundary line, which are within the scope of the general public objectives of this petition.

Further to authorize the Selectmen and Conservation Commission to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Town of Georgetown delineating mutual jurisdictional responsibility for that portion of the Camp Denison property (Essex County Registry of Deeds Book 14617, Page 406) located within 100 feet of Baldpate Pond; or take any other action thereon.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the Massachusetts Legislature to change the town boundary line between the Towns of Boxford and Georgetown in the vicinity of Baldpate Pond, and to authorize the Selectmen to define the exact location of the new town boundary line, the proposed

boundary line being generally as shown on a plan entitled <u>"Plan of Land Showing the Reconfiguration</u> of Town Boundary Between the Towns of Boxford and Georgetown. <u>Massachusetts</u>" dated September 8, 1999 and revised September 30, 1999, Scale 1" = 60', prepared by Apple Associates, Inc., a copy of which is on file in the office of the Town Clerk, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to approve amendments to the proposed boundary line, which are within the scope of the general public objectives of this petition.

Further to authorize the Selectmen and Conservation Commission to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Town of Georgetown delineating mutual jurisdictional responsibility for that portion of the Camp Denison property (Essex County Registry of Deeds Book 14617, Page 400) located within 100 feet of Baldpate Pond.

Finance Committee recommended adoption of this article.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will rescind Article 55 of the May 11, 1999 Annual Lown Meeting and restore its Bylaws to read:

Section 1. Board of Selectmen

2-1-1 "A Board of Selectmen of three members shall be elected from the Town at large for year overlapping terms of office. The Board shall exercise general supervision ov matters affecting the interest and welfare of the Town" (1929); or take any other : thereon.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by majority voice vote, to mov question.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was DEFEATED, by majority voice vote to re Article 55 of the May 11, 1999 Annual Town Meeting and restore its Bylaws.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to dissolve the Special Town Meeting.

Upon a motion made and duly seconded, it was VOTED, by unanimous voice vote, to dissolv Special Town Meeting at 11:00 p.m.
